III. APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF THE 2006 ANNUAL MEETING

TRINITY EPISCOPAL CHURCH MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING JANUARY 22, 2006

The meeting was called to order at 10:20 am by Carol Cormier, Senior Warden. There were sixty-three parishioners in attendance. Four new members signed in.

The Rev. Christopher Carlisle opened the meeting with a prayer for our parish during this transition period.

Minutes of the Annual Meeting of Trinity Church held on January 30, 2005.

A Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to accept the Minutes of the 2005 Annual Meeting as presented.

It was brought to the meeting's attention that on Page 7 of the Clergy Report, Jean Boyer's name was omitted from the list of funerals. Carol noted her funeral was not held at Trinity Church, but we certainly remember her passing.

REPORTS

<u>Warden's Report:</u> Carol Cormier addressed the meeting. She said she wanted to talk about 2006, an opportunity year. This is a year we are going to be doing God's work and getting things done. We are Trinity. The first thing is a Rector search. Last Sunday, Sarah Shoftstall from the Diocese came and spoke to the Vestry after our service. She talked to us about the search process. The normal search process takes 18 months. Based on the conversations at that meeting, the Vestry voted on an expedited search.

This will mean the search committee will be doing the same work but more quickly. We could have a Rector by late summer or early fall. We need a Search Committee made up of some Vestry members and some members of the parish. We are calling people to see if they are interested in being on the search committee. The Vestry will appoint the search committee from those who express an interest in being a member. Sarah Shofstall will meet with the Search Committee on February 1.

The Search Committee will put together the Parish Profile. Sarah will be going to a conference in March of people in her position. Those attending this conference will swap names of those looking for a post. Sara will then give a short list of those names to the Committee. The Search Committee will be then interviewing these candidates, eventually getting down to the one person to whom they would offer the position.

The priest who may come here will be looking at the Trinity web site and the Parish Profile. Finding a priest is everyone's job. If the committee doesn't like anyone on the list, the next time they will receive a list will be in the fall. Sarah attends the convention twice a year, in March and September.

We need to get the person God wants us to have.

The cost of finding a new Rector shocked us. The cost from start to finish is about \$25,000. We will manage the money wisely, but the parish needs to know there is a cost for finding and moving a new priest here to Trinity. One of the most important things we can do at this time is to pray together, pray for Trinity daily. A prayer for Trinity and the search was distributed to those present.

Another challenge we have this year is to find someone to take over the church school. Steve Ketcham will be leaving the position he has held at the end of the school year and we have to replace Steve and continue to educate our children. Steve was thanked with a round of applause.

Another thing that is going to be happening is, by request of the Diocese, every church is going to be doing a revisioning. We are fortunate to have Bill Coyne coming the first Sunday of March to be our co-facilitator during the revisioning. Basically, revisioning is getting together after a Sunday service and brain storming for our church and for the Diocese. It looks to be a fun exercise and Carol hoped all would participate and show their support for Trinity and the Diocese.

Parishioners will be getting an invitation soon. Verna said we will be piggy-backing on this in planning for the Parish Profile. Things that we will be talking about in the revisioning process will also be used in the Parish Profile.

May 6 is the date of the Celebration in Springfield.

Bishop Scruton will be visiting Trinity on May 20 and 21 for Confirmation. Beth Washburn, assisted by Jorja Ketcham, are conducting a Confirmation Class. Carol thanked Beth and Jorja for doing this.

At the Annual Convention, each parish was asked to make a presentation. Gayle Ruscitti put together a poster on the "Walking in the Way" program. Verna took the poster to the Convention and made the presentation. These presentations were filmed and the DVD shows Verna talking about "Walking in the Way."

Last year, Alan Atherton. Janice Ford and Carol went to the Stewardship and Evangelism Conference in Westborough. They attended different workshops and Janice attended the workshop on Member Mission. Janice introduced Member Mission to some of the leaders at Trinity this past summer. From that, we brought the Member Mission to the Vestry. The nuts and bolts of this is that everyone has a mission to bring love and justice to the world. The church's roll is to equip you to do that. Trinity is going to offer 5 scholarships for people who would like to attend the Stewardship and Evangelism Conference this year. Let us know by early February as this convention usually sells out early. Speak to Carol or Marcia Anzalone if you are interested.

When Janice attended the Member Mission workshop, she bought the book and added her name and phone number to a list of attendees in the workshop. Out of the blue, about two weeks ago, she got a phone call from Rev. Wayne Schwab, the man who wrote the book . He wanted to know if we were doing anything about Member Mission. She said, "Yes we are" and he wanted to speak with Carol and Verna. Carol and Verna had a conference call with him on Friday morning and told him what we were trying to do with Member Mission and said on our Vestry retreat this year we would like to do Member Mission. He said, "Wouldn't it be wonderful if I could be there." He will be coming down and doing Member Mission on March 25 and 26 and will preach at Trinity on Sunday, March 26. Yesterday he called and asked if he could bring John LeSeuer with him to bring God¹s message of bringing love and justice to the world.

Carol called attention to the Trinity Mission Statement on the back of the prayer book mark.

Out of Member Mission the Pastoral Care group is looking forward to a recipe/bake night. They want volunteers to come together with recipes and prepare meals for people when they are ill and need some help. They would like to freeze some meals ahead of time so they are ready when needed. Mary Johnson spoke to the meeting regarding this project.

Carol wanted all the parishioners to be aware that during this time of transition we are not standing still but moving ahead with many exciting things in our future.

Treasurer's Report: Cheryl Eidinger-Taylor said the first several pages of the Treasurer's Report is the end-of-year summary of the monies coming in and going out. Cheryl wanted to explain that if you look at the Collector's report, you will see some different figures than are in the budget. One of the reasons for that is the budget is based on those items that we can count on; pledges, interest income from Diocesan holdings, funds from weddings, baptisms, rentals, Al-Anon, etc. We assume we can bring in some funds from our fund raising events. Expenses are things we know of from year to year.

Some of the things in the Collector's report are special causes such as hurricane Katrina. This would not be a budget item. The same thing would apply to UTO and any other special collections we hold during the year – it is money in - money out. The air conditioning fund was for the purchase of the air conditioning.

Last year we had budgeted \$114,000 in pledges but had received \$123,000 in pledges. We were very fortunate to collect \$9,000 more than we had budgeted. That left \$16,467 in faith funding.

When Cheryl took over as Treasurer she found \$9,000 in a CD no one seemed to know about. The Vestry took \$6,035 of this, which was principal, and moved it into the Diocesan fund. \$3,000 was moved to faith funding. The interest accumulated over several years.

Budget for 2006

Income: There is a plate line of what we received last year and a budget income of \$110,000 based on what was pledged as of today. The realities are that we are in a fairly good position financially. We will pray that more money will come in pledged this year. There is about \$3,000 in special day offerings. Other items are based on what was actually collected as income in 2005.

Expenses: The heating fuel price has risen drastically. That is the reason Fr. Paul asked for donations to heating fuel rather than for flowers. We have been blessed with some warmer weather the last few weeks and perhaps we won't have to spend all the money we have budgeted for fuel.

The finance committee also took into account that we do not have a Rector's salary for the first quarter, at least. All line items have been changed to three-quarter of a year for this year only. Medical and dental for Fr. Paul were lower than would be for another priest because he took advantage of insurance from his former employer. Last year all salaries were increased.

Beth Washburn asked if the pastoral staff subscriptions had been updated. Cheryl said she has a new list and the expenses for last year and this year are about \$250.

Expenses for background checks: The Diocese is going to help with the first 5 checks for this year free. Background checks are required under the Safe Church program. We don't have all the information on this as yet.

A question was asked about funds available in the Capital Improvement Fund. Cheryl said there was about \$27,000 available for steeple and/or furnace repair or replacement. Monies are being added to the fund every month.

Another question was asked about the \$25,000 estimated for Rector Search - where would it come from. With the expedited search, we will try to keep the costs down.

Savings of about \$70 a month have been made by changing the phone system and adding DSL. Marcia negotiated with the trash removal company and was able to reduce our expenses by one half. Paul Sweet is doing research on installing a new furnace. We are also looking at the hot water system.

Gayle Ruscitti asked if there should be a line item for Member Mission. Carol explained there was an increase in the line item for Pastoral Care which could cover meals and flowers for the home bound.

There is an increase in the line item for Stewardship, Education and Supplies as part of Member Mission it was decided to make Stewardship a year-round process.

Lou Parente inquired about funding for getting the rectory ready for the new rector. Maintenance and Repairs has \$500 set aside for that and there is also \$150 left and \$1800 in Property Management Fund. Carol said she feels about \$2,000 worth of work needs to be done at the rectory. A professional is needed to look at the hole in the ceiling.

The completed Parish Profile will be going on the web site. It does not need to go to printing therefore saving money.

Steve Ketcham said as the head of the previous Search Committee, they called the closest candidates first to save money. He said he would be glad to answer any questions the present committee may have.

Cheryl said we want to interview new members and find out why they chose Trinity. We had wonderful growth last year. When asked why people left, the bulk of those who are no longer with us passed away.

Barbara Dutko questioned the fuel costs. Cheryl explained the costs went up in September \$700 a month. Conservation of heat is an on-going priority.

Beth offered that the Diocese may come up with a plan to help with heating costs.

When questioned on the increase in postage, Cheryl explained Fr. Paul had a message campaign for new people who moved into the area. This doubled the postage. The newsletter will be mailed out every other month and we are looking into getting as many parishioners' e-mail addresses as possible with the possibility of e-mailing the newsletter in the future. A paper was circulated for those people who wanted to add their e-mail address to the records.

Nominations and Elections:

VESTRY

Senior Warden: The Clerk was asked to cast one vote for Carol Cormier to be elected Senior Warden for 2006 after a call three times for nominations from the floor of the meeting.

Junior Warden: The Clerk was asked to cast one vote for Verna Kosiba to be elected Junior Warden for 2006 after a call three times for nominations from the floor of the meeting.

Treasurer: The Clerk was asked to cast one vote for Cheryl Eidinger-Taylor to be elected Treasurer for 2006 after a call three times for nominations from the floor of the meeting.

Clerk: The Clerk was asked to cast one vote for Lee Kalns to be elected Clerk for 2006 after a call three times for nominations from the floor of the meeting.

Vestry Members (4 Three Year Terms): There were four candidates on the ballot for Vestry: Walter Piasecki, Mary Torian, Beth Washburn and Maryellen Yaroshefski. Nominations were also taken from the floor. Nancy Sharoogian was nominated and accepted the nomination. The following four people were then elected (by paper ballot) to the Vestry for three years:

Walter Piasecki, Mary Torian, Beth Washburn and Maryellen Yaroshefski.

OTHER ELECTED POSITIONS:

Collector: The Clerk was asked to cast one vote for Deborah Murphy to be elected Collector for 2006 after a call three times for nominations from the floor of the meeting.

Assistant Collector: Scott Timpany was nominated and accepted the nomination. After a call three times for nominations from the floor, the Clerk was asked to cast one vote for Scott Timpany to be elected Assistant Collector for 2006.

Delegates to Deanery and Diocesan Convention: The Clerk was asked to cast one vote for Steve Ketcham for his second year of a two year term, and Beth Washburn for her first year of a two year term, as delegates to Deanery and Diocesan Convention after a call three times for nominations from the floor of the meeting. Verna Kosiba is automatically considered a delegate because she was elected Junior Warden.

Alternate Delegate to Deanery and Diocesan Convention: The Clerk was asked to cast one vote for Marcia Anzalone for her second year of a two year term as Alternate Delegate to Deanery and Diocesan Convention and Mary Torian who was nominated from the floor, for her first year of a two year term after a call three times for nominations from the floor of the meeting.

Carol thanked the outgoing Vestry members Lou Parente, Gayle Ruscitti and Alan Atherton for their service to Trinity Church.

A Motion was made, seconded and voted that the Budget for 2006 be accepted as presented.

The assembled parishioners thanked Cheryl Eidinger-Taylor for all her hard work.

Steve Ketcham asked that parishioners visit the Trinity web site and if any changes should be made, please notify him.

After reading the prayer for Trinity Church, the meeting was adjourned at 12:30 pm.

IV. REPORT OF THE RECTOR

RECTOR'S REPORT

Transitions! There is so much to learn. Meeting the congregation; figuring out where the grocery store is; who to call at 7am on a Sunday morning when there is no heat in the church; finding doctors, dentists, barbers, car repair; making the office space work for me; developing relationships! All these and so many more are part of making a move to a completely new situation. Merline and I have been blessed by your warm and enthusiastic welcome. As I continue to meet members of Trinity, to share in your concerns, and learn where your passions lie, I find that I have come to a strong healthy community.

After being at Trinity for just a few weeks, I attended my first Diocesan Convention. At the Convention the diocese approved a change to the Canons (the "laws" governing the church) and adopted a new definition of a "Healthy Mission Focused Congregation." As I continue my transition to *Trinity*, to *The Diocese of Western Massachusetts*, to *Milford* and to *Hopedale*, I thought it would be good to keep both Trinity's goals, as expressed in our Parish Profile, and the definition of a "Healthy Mission Focused Congregation" as accepted by the members of our Diocese, in our sights.

From our Trinity Parish Profile:

Trinity Episcopal Church is expecting the following qualities and capabilities in our new Rector:

- **∨** A True love for our Savior, Jesus Christ
- ✓ A Spiritually grounded individual with an active prayer life from which his/her preaching, pastoral care, liturgical leadership and spiritual guidance flow.
- ✔ A Rector who proclaims the Good News in a personal way, with joy, wonder, intelligence and a sense of humor.
- ✔ An ability to deliver Sermons that are instructive and illuminating, relating the Scriptures to daily life and current events. Good Preaching should challenge the congregation spiritually and intellectually.
- ✔ A commitment to Pastoral Care, Counseling and Visitation while working hand in hand with the Parish Nurse.
- ✔ An advocate for effective church school and youth programs, lending support, guidance, and perspective to these critical ministries.
- \mathbf{v} A love of liturgy and an ability to preside with ease and grace.
- ✔ A comfort level with liturgical exploration and the discussion and opinions that surround it.
- ▼ A nurturer of Adult Spiritual Formation and an active promoter of its expansion.
- ✔ An embracer of diversity. We welcome all of God's people in all of their wondrous diversity.
- ✔ A leader in the community with a willingness to be involved in the local community and our covenant with St. Mary's Parish.
- **v** A strong understanding of family and relationship dynamics.
- \checkmark A skilled guide and pillar in crisis.

Our next Rector will feel comfortable working with the Vestry and delegating authority to the staff and committees. We look to the Rector to build consensus on challenging issues, rather than dispense with controversy autocratically. Strong communication skills are a must. We seek a person who is genuine, warm, a person who is excited with the joy and love of Christ, one with a gentle sense of humor, and a willingness to try to move us and make us think at the altar.

And from our Diocesan Canons:

Canon 16, Section 13 The Basic Standards of a Healthy Mission Focused Congregation Standards of Purpose

(a) The healthy congregation shall support the mission of the Church, "to restore all people to unity with God and each other in Christ." By teaching the Christian faith, promoting the public worship of Almighty God, and administering the Sacraments according to the doctrine, discipline and worship of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, now commonly referred to as the Episcopal Church, the healthy congregation develops mission-focused Christians who bear witness to Christ and live the fullness of the baptismal covenant wherever God places them.

Standards as a Constituent Part

- (b) The healthy congregation will order its common life as a constituent part of the Diocese of Western Massachusetts in concert with
 - 1) the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of Western Massachusetts,
 - 2) resolutions of the Diocesan Convention and Diocesan Council
 - 3) and the pastoral oversight of the Bishop.
- (c) The Diocese being a constituent part of the Episcopal Church, the healthy congregation will also order its common life in concert with
 - 1) the Constitution and Canons of the Episcopal Church
 - 2) resolutions of the General Convention and the Executive Council of the Episcopal Church.
- (d) Congregations will be incorporated according to the laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, following their admission as a Parish in union with the Convention in accordance with Article XIII of the Constitution.

Standards of Worship

(e) The healthy congregation shall offer a weekly worship opportunity, with the Holy Eucharist being the principal act of worship on the Lord's Day whenever possible, and at a minimum once a month.

Standards of Leadership and Mutual Accountability

- (f) The healthy congregation shall call and retain a priest, or be placed in the charge of a priest by the Bishop, in accordance with the Canons of this Diocese, and shall discern and identify lay leaders to be duly elected or appointed to the positions prescribed by this Canon. Best practice recommends that the members of the Vestry of a congregation should not be related by blood or marriage to one another, to the other officers, or to the paid staff of the congregation.
- (g) The healthy congregation shall compensate clergy and lay staff and provide for reimbursement of expenses within the guidelines provided by the Diocese.
- (h) As members of the Diocese, clergy and lay leaders of healthy congregations shall participate in Diocesan Conventions and other gatherings in order to shape and share in the mission and ministry of the Diocese.
- (i) Healthy congregations will meet their financial obligations in a timely manner, will maintain adequate levels of insurance, and will not, except in extraordinary circumstances, invade the principal of trust, endowment and other invested funds.
- (j) Concerning the collection, review, use, and dissemination of information, leaders of healthy congregations shall

- 1) Prepare an annual budget to be approved by the Vestry and presented to the congregation at the Annual Meeting.
- 2) Complete and submit the congregation's annual parochial report by the deadline.
- 3) Arrange and receive an audit of the congregation's financial records and practices and submit an Audit Certificate to the Diocese by the deadline.
- 4) Accept the congregation's Assessment for Common Ministry by the deadline, and fulfill the commitment by regular monthly payments.
- 5) Monitor and review the attendance at public worship, the number of gifts and level of giving, and the number of baptisms, confirmations, marriages, and burials, in order to evaluate how effectively the congregation is supporting and promoting people's commitment to Jesus Christ.
- 6) Conduct an annual safe church audit to review the safe church policy of the Diocese and the congregation's implementation of it. The goals of the audit are to ensure appropriate steps are taken to keep the congregation a safe community for all and to protect the privacy of individuals who have been screened.
- 7) Monitor and review the balance between funds allocated for internal operations of the congregation and funds allocated for outreach and mission. The healthy congregation will generously support local, regional, and global outreach and missionary efforts.
- 8) Participate regularly in a mutual ministry review, a process by which the vestry and rector review the effectiveness of the entire ministry of the parish. The healthy congregation will invite an outside consultant to lead this review at least bi-annually.

These are the measures by which Trinity conducted its search for the new rector and these are the measures by which Trinity evaluates its health.

As our Bishop said on Wednesday evening after you presented all the various symbols of the ministries of Trinity: "We offer thanksgiving to God for the ministries represented by these symbols, and ask God's grace to live ever more fully into the commitments we have made in Baptism."

We will grow together over these coming months and years, continuing to live into the law as Jesus gave it to us:

CHILDREN'S CHRISTIAN SPIRITUAL FORMATION REPORT "WoRM...(formerly known as Sunday School)"

Well here we are, more than four months into the Sunday school year and the new Workshop Rotation Model (WoRM) has wiggled right into our hearts. It has been, as they say, quite a ride. With the support of our wardens and vestry, the WoRM committee of six created a vision for a new type of Christian Education for Trinity's youth. With the dedication of that same committee and some consistent volunteers, that vision has become a reality.

So far our "kids" have studied the story of Jonah, learned about Baptism and Advent, and now they are in the midst of a Creation module – boy God was very busy that first "week." Activities range from creating and playing theme specific games, creative crafts, artwork and writings exploring our topics, to movies and music that tell us more about the stories we are studying. Our next rotations, which are in the throws of being detailed out, will be themed to the Last Supper and Communion and the story of Samuel, the boy who listened; modules that promise a flurry of activities.

So.... "How do we do it?" You might ask, or more importantly, "How can I get involved?" (Yes we need your help!) First know that this project is one that we as committee members never thought that we had the necessary talent, time, or energy for but this has been a fabulous experience! The children are enthusiastic (boredom is at a minimum because there is something new each week) and attendance is

consistent, they keep coming back – a sign we are doing something right! It is incredibly rewarding watching and listening as they become more and more involved. All of this brings us to – "the rewards outweigh the work." Any volunteer will be greeted with open arms. The activities are planned out, the materials are available, and absolutely NO requirements for you to be a biblical scholar! We start each Sunday with a review of the Module theme and then break into age appropriate groups for the day's activities.

A minimum of two caring adults per class, three classes per week is what is needed. Sign up schedule is located on the wall downstairs outside of the chapel room. I urge you to think about signing up for a class. You can sign up for one class at a time or one 4 week rotation at a time. And we DO understand, life is hectic, if you sign up for a time and find you can't do it- no problem – just let us know, and we will work it out.

To you PARENTS, again – thank you for the privilege of allowing me to get to know your children – they are remarkable! To ALL – come and see what we have seen, the blessings and growth of our youth! Trinity's WoRM Leaders

MISSION COMMITTEE REPORT

The Mission Committee met several times this year to discuss disbursements and also to discuss the various charities we send disbursements to. We sponsored the "CHOAW" for HEIFER collection with the Sunday School during Lent and also Operation Christmas Child's shoe box collection in October. During November we assembled and delivered Thanksgiving baskets. In December, we sponsored the Jesse Tree as well as collected items for Liberia. We continued with our on-going projects of collecting card fronts for St. Jude's Ranch for Children and also empty bottles and cans, as well as collecting items for the Daily Bread Food Pantry.

We had a budget of \$4600 this year, as well as income from the Mission Envelopes and donations and from the Bottle/Can returns. We disbursed over \$5050 this year:

Mac blessed the shoeboxes during the service on the Sunday they were collected. The shoe boxes were delivered to a drop off collection point at the Baptist Church in Holliston. From there they were then transported to Boone, North Carolina and from there they were

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brought to various parts of the world. This was our eighth year Trinity has participated in Operation Christmas Child. Thank you to the Parish for making it a success.

Thank you to everyone who donated food for the Thanksgiving Food Baskets. Special thanks to those who helped to assemble and deliver the baskets. The extra Turkey that was left over was given to the Salvation Army for their Christmas Dinner baskets. Parishioners from Trinity, along with Parishioners of St. Mary's, helped deliver hot meals on Thanksgiving Day to those in the community who requested. Thank you to everyone who participated.

It should also be noted that another form of outreach is Trinity allowing other groups outside of Trinity to use our building (AA & Al-Anon groups).

This year's Jesse Tree contained ornaments for the children and adults at the Winter Haven Shelter and for some Parishioners and others in need. Thank you to everyone who chose an ornament, you helped many people this Christmas.

The Mission Committee also took on a special collection for Liberia this December. This collection was for items needed for the Church being built in Liberia, as well as the surrounding community. We collected over \$60 to help with the shipping costs, as well as many needed items. A full list of what was shipped is posted on the bulletin board at the top of the stairs, but some items included skeins of yarn, sewing supplies, school supplies, paper towels, and personal hygiene items. Many personal health kits were made from the personal hygiene items that were donated. Thank you to everyone who donated to this, it was a great success!!

Thank you to everyone who brought in his or her empty soda/beer cans and bottles and dropped them off in the box by the cellar. Thanks especially to those to returned their bottles/cans and dropped the money off in the collection plate indicating it was bottle money. A special thanks goes to Clinton Clark (and Marion) who oversees the bottles and cans program.

Thank you to the parishioners who bring in canned/boxed items for the Daily Bread Food Pantry each week. We will be continuing with the special monthly collections. Thank you especially to those parishioners who deliver the donated items to the pantry each week.

We also continue to collect old greeting cards for St. Jude's Ranch for Children. The Children create new cards from the old ones and then sell the new cards to help purchase items they need.

Thank you to Barbara Dutko, Sandy Foran, Ruth Doyle and Millie Williams for their help this year with the Mission Committee. Also thank you to Clinton and Marion Clark, Pat Ward (Trinity's Representative to the Daily Bread Food Pantry), Marcia Anzalone, Magee Lambert, Beth Washburn, Cheryl Taylor, Deb Murphy, Scott Timpany, Carol Cormier, Verna Kosiba and Fr. Mac, all of whose help throughout the year was much appreciated.

This coming year the Mission Committee will be looking at the various charities we donate to, looking to see which ones provide basic needs to people and which ones are Christian based. We also will be looking at sponsoring another special collection during Lent. As always, we welcome Parishioners to join us at our meetings, which are always open to all. We generally meet the third Sunday of each month at 9am.

Finally, thank you to all Parishioners at Trinity, without your help the Mission Committee would not be able to do all the good work that was done this year.

I feel personally very good about the music program this past year, and I feel particularly blessed with such warm and wonderful people without whom there would be no program.

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The Chancel Choir continues to rehearse weekly on Tuesday evenings at 7:30. Attendance varies between 10 and 13. (Our 2 or 3 men could use some companion singers!) The anthems are sounding more confident, and we have tackled some new and challenging material. My goals for this group include increasing membership, peculiarly tenors and basses, and the ability to make choices less "attendance-dependent". I would, in addition, like to continue adding other instrumentation, both from within and from outside the church membership.

The Children's Choir, ably assisted by Jane Hanrahan, rehearses on Church School Sundays in the lower chapel area. The group varies in number from 6 to 12, and two of these are competent newcomers to the handbell ringers. Recently, the children sang carols in the homes of four shut-ins who were selected by Mary Johnson, parish nurse. Adults and children together alike (over 50!) made a tremendous impact. This activity should definitely become an annual tradition!

The Handbell Choir of seven (right now we own 14 bells) has played for four festive services this year. I would love to see this group become a more visible part of the music program, including all ages over 10.

Looking back over my five years at Trinity, I see a program having grown considerably with the help of many more enthusiastic people!

More goals? How about a series of concerts, musical accompaniment to receptions and dinners as appropriate, expanded social activities for the children, an in-town theatre group for interested adults, participation in handbell and vocal workshops in the area, group trips to concerts, etc.

PARISH NURSE REPORT

Trinity continued with it's tradition of delivering flowers to the home bound for Easter and Christmas. We ordered and delivered 18 lilies and poinsettias, which were delivered by volunteers. We also delivered prayer shawls to parishioners. Most of the cost of the yarn was donated by people who made the shawls and other people who donated yarn. We also started a new tradition of giving a hand made baby blanket to children who are being baptized at Trinity. I spent \$50.49 on yarn which was given to the prayer shawl committee to help with the cost of making shawls and blankets. Both the shawls and blankets were very well received and appreciated by the recipients. All were knit or crocheted with prayers included and Father Mac had some of the blankets passed around the church and prayed for by the whole congregation before we gave them to the families.

We have a small group of people who are actively serving as Lay Eucharistic Visitors.

We bring communion to twelve people. Our goal is to bring each person communion once a month. At times we do make visits to home bound people without bringing communion. We had one meeting this fall and are planning another meeting January 9, 2007. Father Mac will get information about the next LEV training session the diocese will hold that is fairly close to us for anyone who is interested in being licensed as a LEV. We do have a few people who are licensed who are not actively serving right now. We would happily welcome their services whenever they are ready to serve again. We would also encourage anyone who is not licensed to join our visitors and go along as a companion on these home visits.

We continue to grow the program of Healing Meals that we started up last year. We spent \$411.22 on Dream Dinners to have meals in the freezer at church ready to be delivered. We received \$500 from the Congregational Development Investments for this program. We also had meals prepared by parishioners and the cost of these meals was donated by these people. We delivered a total of 20 meals. Seven of these were homemade by parishioners, the rest were Dream dinners. Six of these meals were delivered to non-members and we offered six people meals and the offer was declined. I feel the meals that people received

were appreciated and we received notes expressing their gratitude and the emotions that were elicited by the kind gesture. There are several meals in the freezer ready to be delivered. We have some volunteers who are willing to deliver meals and some who will prepare them. We have plans to expand and grow this program in the future. We want to see more members involved in the preparation and delivery of the meals and also more people who are willing to accept the meals. We also want to see more members thinking of people who could use the helping hand and grabbing a meal from the freezer to bring to them. We do have a grace available on the freezer door to go with each meal.

This year I have spent a lot of my time and energy visiting the home bound. We had a wonderful Christmas caroling event in December to four homes of church members who don't get out much anymore. It was an amazing success with more than 40 people attending. Many would like to see this as an annual event. I visited people in nursing homes and at the hospital. I was available a few times to check blood pressures during coffee hour. Next year I would like to make that a regular event, such as the second Sunday of the month is blood pressure Sunday. I would also like to spend more time on teaching next year. Perhaps have a class or a lecture every other month on some health topic. I could be the speaker of we could have some guest speakers. "The Walking in the Way Program" and the "Simple Suppers for Thinking Slimmer" were very low key this year but look for them to return next year.

Finally, I was available the first Sunday of each month for healing prayers at the altar. I volunteered to do this after Father Paul left to replace the healing service he held the first Sunday. I know we had answers to prayers and people told me of their healing through prayer. We will continue with these healing prayers on the first Sunday with the addition of Father Mac praying with us.

It was an exciting and productive year.

We also had the opportunity over the summer to knit with the Hands to Work knitting group of St. Mary's Church, our sister parish.

PROPERTY COMMITTEE REPORT

Committee Leads: Paul Sweet and Ron Gorham

The majority of property issues for 2006 were focused on improvements to the rectory in preparation of receiving our new Rector, Father William "Mac" Murray. Improvements in the sum of approximately \$14,000 have been provided, which included interior finishes and painting, electrical/plumbing fixtures, kitchen appliances, roof replacement, window shutters, chimney repairs, general cleaning inside and out, etc. Donations of roofing materials and a stove saved Trinity roughly \$5000. On top of that, countless volunteer hours by many parishioners were expended to ensure that the rectory remains a safe and welcoming home to Father Mac and his wife, Merline.

Discussions for the church in 2006 centered on the need for a new boiler supplying heat to the church offices and meeting rooms in the lower level. One contractor visited in September to conduct a heat study

and offer a quote for the boiler and options for re-zoning the affected heat zones. A second quote is being obtained in early 2007 so that a competitive bid can be accepted to begin work as soon as possible to replace the very old equipment.

A dedicated property committee is being established in 2007 to assess and prioritize property related issues for Trinity Church and the rectory. Projects will include the boiler upgrade, an energy audit, and an overall "physical plant evaluation" to determine if there are opportunities for reducing utility costs, as well as ensuring that our church and rectory remain safe and comfortable. If you have any concerns or would like to assist in this area, please contact Paul Sweet.

SEARCH COMMITTEE REPORT

The Search Committee was carefully populated with representatives from all facets of the Trinity community. It was tasked with the responsibility to conduct a thorough investigation of the available Candidates and provide the Vestry with the name of the person voted a best match for Trinity's needs. The schedule was aggressive and the list of available Candidates was very extensive. The following process was followed:

- Met with The Canon to the Ordinary (Sarah Shofstall), and learned our true responsibility which is to take the pulse of the Trinity community and derive a set of requirements which must be met to allow us to narrow the search. Sarah also explained the lengthy process in detail to allow us to create a schedule and list of tasks for the next several months to a year.
- Created questionnaires to help put our fingers on the pulse of Trinity in 2006. The pulse represents Trinity's needs, desires, and future hopes and plans.
- Created a Profile document which explains what Trinity is all about: past, present, and future. The Profile is the first glimpse of Trinity that the Candidates were exposed to and on what they based their first opinions and decisions to consider us or not. The Profile was extremely important in the search process, and was created and published in a very aggressive and professional manner to emerge as the example Sarah showed other churches in the future.
- The list of 24 Candidates was systematically reduced with the following process: (Note that each and every communication with the Candidates was pre-prepared and standardized to allow for equal comparison. Each and every decision made with respect to the Candidates was democratically voted on by the Search Committee.):
 - Each Candidate was contacted by phone and asked list of questions by individual Committee members. The answers were written down and discussed by the Committee.
 - Each of the remaining Candidates was sent a list of questions that were designed to allow the Search Committee to delve deeper into the individual's beliefs and styles of worship, leadership, and relationship. They replied with written answers which were read and compared by the Search Committee.
 - Each of the remaining Candidates was asked to send a recording of a sermon.
 - Each of the remaining Candidates was interviewed over the speaker phone by the Search Committee.
 - Each of the remaining Candidates and their spouses were invited to Trinity for a personal tour of the church, rectory, town, and whatever else they may be interested in. During their 2-3 days of travel, they became more familiar with us and our lives, environment, weather, attitude, energy and heartbeat. The Candidates graced us with a sermon at Trinity as well as their participation in a several hour personal interview.

During their visit to Trinity, they were driven to an interview with the Bishop in Springfield.

- The final Candidates required the blessing of the Bishop prior to providing the name to the Vestry.
- The Search Committee met with the Vestry and discussed the final Candidates, and answered questions.
- The Vestry and Sr. Warden extended the offer to Fr. Mac Murray.
