




A Reading from the Letter to the Hebrews

When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, the parents of Jesus brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord (as it is written in the law of the Lord, "Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord"), and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, "a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons."

Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what was customary under the law, Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying,

"Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace, according to your word; for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel."

And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, "This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed-- and a sword will pierce your own soul too."

There was also a prophet, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was of a great age, having lived with her husband seven years after her marriage, then as a widow to the age of eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshiped there with fasting and prayer night and day. At that moment she came, and began to praise God and to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem.

When they had finished everything required by the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favor of God was upon him.





### III. APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF THE 2012 ANNUAL MEETING

## Minutes of the 2012 Annual Meeting February 3, 2013

### I. Call to Order and Opening Prayer

The 2012 Annual Meeting was incorporated into a joint 9 AM Eucharistic worship service held in the Parish Hall and included reports for the year 2012.

Annual reports from the Warden's and Rector followed the Gospel.

Warden Gayle Ruscitti was inspired by reading the entire annual report and noted that our times of flux with more bad than good happening have subsided. From stability, we are in a good and happy place. With the large number of reports in our annual document and the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the church approaching, it is a good time to reflect, explore and move forward into our mission statement.

Warden Ann Marie Lockwood expressed identity with senatorial candidate Scott Brown's recent and multiple campaigns as she hopes to enter her third term of service as Junior Warden. She noted how many parishes in our diocese are much worse off in many ways. She observed that one thing we could do to improve would be, as a parish, to give thoughtful consideration to accepting leadership roles. There is a need to rotate leadership to maintain the health of Trinity. A welcome was expressed to former parishioner, Vanna Harrison, who visited Trinity today from Florida as she was celebrating the birth of a grandchild.

Father Mac reflected upon his 10<sup>th</sup> year anniversary of being ordained and his 7<sup>th</sup> year of service at Trinity. This was the first time in over 20 years that this parish had ever been able to provide a sabbatical for its priest. He noted the health of the parish with new families bringing all ages of children. He gives thanks for all our gifts: those who maintain the facilities as well as those who help with youth, Sunday services and all other aspects of parish life. The May Vestry meeting will be a night for Mutual Ministry Review. People in the neighborhood now know Trinity to be more than just a church building through its meals programs, contributions to the food pantry, Christmas Faire and other functions. He concluded by urging us to think about what ministry 'you would like to plug into!'

At the conclusion of the worship service, a pot luck brunch was served as parishioners settled into the business portion of the Annual Meeting.

### II. Approval of the Agenda

A motion was made and seconded from the floor to accept the agenda for the 2013 Annual Meeting (reports from the year 2012) as presented. It passed unanimously.

### III. Approval of the Minutes from the January 29, 2012 Annual Meeting

A motion was made and seconded from the floor to accept the minutes as presented. It passed unanimously.

### V. Parish Committee Reports

Parish Committee Reports were printed in the Annual Report.

A motion was made to accept the committee reports. It was seconded and passed unanimously.

### VI. Report of the Election

All elections were unanimous. No paper ballots were required.

### VII. Report of the Treasurer-

The Report of the Treasurer was also given by Fr. Mac.

In the coming year, a budget snapshot will be included in the Sunday bulletin. Trinity ended 2012 with pledge income deficit. We were also behind in total income. The church uses a cash accounting method. Through under-spending, the \$217,000 budget finished \$1000 ahead.

A motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to accept the treasurer's report.

A review was presented of the 2013 Budget. Some cuts from the previous year were continued and others were restored. Some staff positions had hours restored with no hourly rate pay increase. \$10000 in pledges has been made, but has not been received as of this meeting. Following discussion from the floor to answer parishioner questions,

a motion was made and seconded to accept the 2013 Budget. The motion passed unanimously.

Fund balances were also reviewed with a motion to approve the balance sheet. This motion was seconded and approved.

Also to encourage and make giving more convenient in the coming year, there will be a mission envelope of the month. Envelopes will be provided with the Sunday bulletin and the focus will be included in the newsletter.

### VIII. Report of the Wardens

Both wardens offered thanks for the support received. Comments are noted above within the worship service.

### IX. Report of the Rector

Father Mac's report was included in the worship service.

### X. Other Business, Blessing and Dismissal

Touie Jackson mentioned the upcoming follow-up meeting for the December Christmas Faire.

Steve Ketcham mentioned the upcoming 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary with numerous activities to commemorate. There are many stories to be told! For example, Ellen Fettig told Mac about the dedication of the children's chapel and the cross given in memory of polio victim, Jean Mary Midgley, now in the Lane Chapel. Other stories surround the dedications of our church windows. It was also mentioned that the author of the book, "My Friend Flicka," was the daughter of a rector at Trinity.

The meeting was closed with prayer and the hymn, "O for a thousand tongues to sing."

A motion to adjourn was made, seconded and passed at 11:20AM.

### **Children's Christian Spiritual Formation**

It seems the longer I stay involved with the Trinity Children's Christian Education program, the more online resources I find to customize a curriculum for our many inquiring minds. This year many of my lessons have been based on material I purchased from a site called TeachSundaySchool.com. I have lessened my repetition this year, trying to spend only 2 weeks on my topics. We have official registration of 43 boys and girls which is identical in census compared to last year. Our weekly average of participants is approximately 18.

This year we started with the "basics" of defining Christianity and exploring what it means to be a Christian. We then took a tour of the Bible, learning the basics of the setup; Old and New Testaments, divisions within each testament, books, chapters and verses. With each new story we learn, we are able to come back to this lesson now that we understand the mapping of the Bible. Since we went back to basics, we started at the beginning discussing the 7 days of Creation. We spent time exploring and celebrating that God makes each of us unique. We built Thankful Trees. Finally, as is tradition, we revisited the story of Christ's birth, adding in a couple new viewpoints on the story. In the weeks ahead we will learn the meaning behind the Lord's Prayer, we will discuss the 10 Commandments, and much more.

The program is a success because of the children who come each week, eager to learn and share their thoughts on how God's love is all around them. This audience along with the dedication of a handful of consistent volunteers is what makes the program a reality.

What could make the program a bigger success? Family "buy in;" what I mean by that is a larger pool of volunteers. Come spend a week in class with your son or daughter. Any volunteer will be greeted with open arms. The activities are planned out, the materials are available (I have become adept at using the Oriental Trader catalog and website!), and there are absolutely NO requirements for you to be a biblical scholar! Believe me, I learn as much (if not more) from the kids as they do from me.

To you PARENTS – thank you for the privilege of allowing me to get to know your children – they are remarkable! To ALL – come and see what I've seen, the blessings and growth of our youth! Respectfully submitted,

#### **Altar Guild**

This year's Lenten Project collected funds for the Diocesan Mission Trip to the Dominican Republic. Thank you to everyone who filled a box or made a donation.

Trinity participated in the Milford Area CROP Walk again this year. It is the fifth year the walk has been held in Milford. Through Church World Service, twenty-five percent of the funds raised remain locally, going to the Milford Salvation Army and Tri-County Elders Meals on Wheels program. The remainder helped Church World Service's many programs.

The Mission Committee held the 'Taste of Trinity' in November. This event raised \$245 for the Daily Bread Food Pantry. Thank you to everyone who made soup, stew, or brought in bread or goodies for this event. Thank you also to Hannaford's for their donation of bread and baked goods. Thank you especially to those who attended the event!

We sponsored Samaritan's Purse Operation Christmas Child. This year with Parishioner's help we collected 52 boxes filled with items for children of different ages, as well as the \$7.00 needed for each box to cover shipping expenses. The shoeboxes were delivered to a drop off collection point at the First Baptist Church in Holliston. From there they were then transported to Boone, North Carolina and from which they were delivered to various parts of the world. Thank you to everyone who filled a box or donated to Samaritan's Purse for the shipping expenses. We hope next year to have the same number or more.

Thank you to everyone who donated food for the Thanksgiving Food Baskets. Special thanks to the Senior Youth Group who helped to assemble them. A very special thank you to those who helped to deliver baskets: Cathy Poch, Cathy Ellis, Mary Johnson, Beth Washburn, Peach Warren and Ann Marie Lockwood. Parishioners from Trinity, along with Parishioners of St. Mary's, helped deliver hot meals on Thanksgiving Day to those in the community who requested. Thank you to everyone who participated.

Another form of outreach is Trinity allowing other groups outside of Trinity to use our building (Al-Anon groups, Brownies/Girl Scouts) and the donating of used eye-glasses to the Milford Lions Club.

This year's Jesse Tree contained slips for parishioners and also adults and children outside of the parish, including some shelter families. The members of Trinity were again very generous this year. Thank you to everyone who took a slip and fulfilled a request. Thank you to Beth Washburn who helped with the sorting. Thank you to those who helped deliver gifts.

Thank you to everyone who brought in his or her empty & clean soda/beer cans & bottles and dropped them off in the box by the cellar. A special thank you to Jack and Penny Allen for overseeing the bottle & can program, and to the parishioners who help Jack and Penny count and redeem them. The funds brought in from the Bottle/Can returns program go to the Daily Bread Food Pantry. This year's amount totaled \$177.65.

Thank you to parishioners who bring in canned/boxed items for the Daily Bread Food Pantry each week. We continue to have the special monthly collections, but anyone can bring in any item, it doesn't necessarily have to be what we are concentrating on for a particular month. Thank you especially to those parishioners who deliver the donated items to the pantry each week. In honor of Trinity's 150th Anniversary, bags were made for parishioners to fill weekly with items for the Pantry.

We are still collecting the fronts of greeting cards and also labels of Campbell's Soup and their affiliated products for the St. Jude's Ranch for Children. Please see the box upstairs in the Library to drop off items.

Thank you to Ruth Doyle, Mary Torian, Millie Williams, and Ann Marie Lockwood for their help this year with the Mission Committee. Also thank you to Pat Ward (Trinity's Representative to the Daily Bread Food Pantry), Jack Allen, Penny Allen, Magee Lambert, Cheryl Taylor, Charlie Johnson, Gayle Ruscitti, Beth Moeller and Fr. Mac, all of whose help throughout the year was much appreciated.

### **Trinity Discretionary Fund**

The purposes for which discretionary funds may be used are outlined in the National Canon, cited below; that is, for the poor and for other "charitable and pious purposes". Obviously gifts to the poor are its primary purpose. Within "other charitable and pious purposes" includes gifts to any recognized charitable organization (the same ones to which an ordinary individual could make a deductible gift), to the church itself and for certain items such as vestments, books, and other professional items which will remain the property of the church when the priest leaves.

The origin of discretionary funds lies in Title III, Canon 14(f) of the National Church, dating back to 1814, which states:

"The Alms and Contributions, not otherwise specifically designated, at the Administration of the Holy Communion on one Sunday in each calendar month, and other offerings for the poor, shall be deposited with the Member of Clergy in charge of the Congregation or such other Church officer as the Member of the Clergy in charge shall appoint to be applied to such pious and charitable uses as shall be thought fit by the Member of the Clergy. When a parish is without a Rector, the Vestry shall appoint a responsible person to serve as Almoner".

While it is now often customary to supplement the discretionary fund with gifts from individuals and also from the church's general operating funds, one item is of particular importance in the Canon. The words "alms", "contributions" and "offerings" are used, which clearly mean that these are funds given to the church and which therefore belong to the church.

Trinity's Discretionary Fund (TDF) is funded primarily from gifts from parishioners designated for the "TDF." In addition all gifts given associated with Baptisms, Marriages and Funerals are used to fund the TDF.

This past year the Committee celebrated its continued existence with the Sixth Annual Senior Fall Social held October 19th at St. Mary's Parish Hall from Noon to 3pm. A light luncheon was served, and the Greater Milford Community Chorus once again provided the seniors with musical entertainment.

The gala November Evensong at Trinity included both children's and adult Trinity choirs joined by members of St. Mary's choir and led by St. Mary's Music Director Robert Blake, assisted by Trinity's Organist Randy Bloom. The Service was followed by a Potluck Supper in the Parish Hall. This event is enjoyed by those from both parishes who look forward to attending each year.

Many don't realize the many things the Covenant Committee has been responsible for in Milford: the Daily Bread Food Pantry, the Thanksgiving Dinner deliveries, the Winterhaven Homeless Shelter (that is no more), the Spring Clean-Up of Senior's homes (not frequent anymore) as well as the aforementioned Fall Social and November Evensong. The most famous was the sponsoring of the two Bosnian refugee families some years ago. That turned out amazingly well.

They may also be interested in looking at pictures of parish activities, or reading more about parish groups or our history.
- 4. *Casual online visitors:* Family members (grandparents, aunts, uncles and so on) who live outside the area may use the website to see pictures of the Christmas pageant or other activities.

### **Mutual Ministry Review**

This past year the group was not only able to hold the VBS, but they were able to buy groceries for over 125 families, replace a families roof, and change an individual's life by purchasing for them an prosthetic leg.

Our mission committee meets to discern where mission funds are needed most out in the community and worldwide. Our parishioners are very generous with the shoeboxes for Operation Christmas Child and the Jesse Tree. Many of our funds go to buy sheep, cows and animals to help families in other countries sustain themselves and contribute to their communities.

Pastorally and spiritually we see the church growing. Pews on Sunday are being filled by new families. Our Stephen Ministry is thriving and supporting our parishioners and our visiting Lay Eucharist Ministry supporting our homebound has grown with new members..

We had a big milestone this past year. We started a yearlong celebration of our 150th anniversary. We started with a lovely evensong with our covenant church St. Mary's on Friday May 17, 2013. On Saturday May18th we held a 150th Gala at the Italian American Veterans club and had a fantastic time. On Sunday May19th Bishop Fisher was with us for a celebration of confirmation, reception and reaffirmation. There is more to come to round out the anniversary year so read your bulletins and Newsletter.

The best way to become informed about Trinity is to read all about the ministries featured here in this report. Read it and you will realize how we as a Parish are living our Mission Statement. I think you will find it phenomenal reading.



### 150 years in Milford. From Adin Ballou's History of the Town of Milford:



V. THE EPISCOPALIAN SOCIETY. Though the Protestant Episcopal Church is comparatively ancient, its representative parish in this town is of recent date. Religious TOWN OF MILFORD, Sunday, May 17, 1863, commencing at 4.30 r.m., conducted by Rev. Reese F. Alsop, of St. John's Church, Framingham. Trinity parish was organized in April, 1864, and was incorporated by act of the Legislature, in May the same year. Its membership consisted of about twenty persons, who signed the parish constitution. Its officers, past and present, without material change, are: Wardens, Charles Dove and George G. Parker; *Vestrymen*, William H. Chamberlain, Charles A. Dewey, James I. C. Cook, William Kelley, Charles J. Thompson, William Nichols, William J. Ferguson, Thomas J. Wales, and Thomas J. Bostock; Treasurer and Collector, Charles Dove; Clerk, C. J. Thompson. Its present number of communicants is about 80. Its Sunday-school numbers about 55 teachers and scholars, under the superintendency of Charles Dove, with a library of 300 vols.

After organization the church maintained regular religious services in Washington Hall until the erection of its sanctuary, situated on Congress Street, corner of Exchange. The land and edifice were paid for by subscription from members of the parish and congregation and outside friends, in sums of from \$5 to \$300, - costing about \$9,000. It was consecrated, with the customary solemuities, March 21, 1871.

More recently a new tower has been erected, and various interior improvements made, at a further cost of \$1,500. Still more recently, the parish has provided itself with an admirable organ, costing complete about \$1,400. The average Sunday audience numbers 100 or

The public have long been accustomed to regard the Episcopalians as an eminently respectable Christian denomination, even though questioning some of their ecclesiastical claims to apostolical descent; and the members of our Trinity Church take honorable rank among the religious people of Milford in all the relations of life. I suppose there is no need of my presenting any statement of their doctrinal or ceremonial peculiarities; all inquirers having ample access to their published expositions of faith, order, and observances. I am indebted to their first warden, Mr. Charles Dove, for most of the foregoing particulars, and also for the following succession of their rectors:-

I give thanks to those that have come before, all of us who are here for a time and for the generations yet to come, who will know God's grace in this place, loving God and loving our neighbors.

There are many ways we have extended ourselves this year to share the love of God and neighbor.

We have expanded our monthly meal program, offering nutritious full dinners on the last Wednesday and Friday of every month. People from around our community – singles, families, children – gather for dinner and fellowship.

Our Saturday service, started in October, is drawing new members, returning members and people for whom Sunday morning presents schedule conflicts.

In addition to our excellent Sunday morning Christian Education program for our children, we now have two very active and vibrant youth groups – Jr. and Sr. High ages.

Our lay pastoral care program, Stephen Ministry, provides dedicated, trained, confidential Christian care givers to walk with members of our community as they tackle life's challenges. I give thanks for all our Stephen Ministers and Leaders. Audrey Kerxhalli, one our original Stephen Leaders, "retired" this year and I give thanks for her service and dedication to this ministry. I thank Verna Kosiba for taking on the coordination of our Stephen Minister's Supervision meetings.

Our choir continues their dedicated service, rehearsing on Tuesday evenings and helping to lead our worship on Sunday mornings. This year has seen transition as we have welcomed Randy Bloom (and Edla Ann) as he stepped into the role of interim Choirmaster and Organist. We all miss the love and care that Liz Pekkala has provided for our adult and children's choirs over these past 13 years.

As I read through our Annual Report I am reminded of what an incredible and active congregation we are. We have saints and angels all around us, blessing us with their gifts and talents. We all have unique gifts to share and I encourage us to express our gratitude to all among us for all the ways we expand God's kingdom here and now.

We are making a difference here in Milford and around the world, living into our mission statement: Sharing the Grace of God, the Light of Christ and the Power of the Holy Spirit, through worship, ministry and fellowship.

An exciting new opportunity is coming to Trinity – Our Bishop and our new Canon to the Ordinary were so excited by their visits to Trinity, that in the spirit of expanding our Mission and Ministry to our community and the world, we are encouraged to take on the services of a deacon. To that end, The Rev. Donna Kingman will be joining us in mid-March as our new Deacon. Donna will spend some time getting to know our Trinity family and will fulfill her role: "To interpret to the Church the needs, concerns, and hopes of the world (particularly the poor, the weak, the sick, and the lonely)." Donna will help us to identify, understand and respond to the needs of our community.

I encourage you to review this report and find the ministry areas you feel called to. If you've got an idea for a ministry that's not already here – talk to me and let's explore it!
