

## Meditation for January 27, 2021 The Conversion of St. Paul the Apostle [transferred]

<sup>15</sup>I asked, "Who are you, Lord?" [Acts 26:15]

For some understanding of the depth of Paul's conversion, I draw upon David Whyte's meditation on his poem "The Opening of Eyes." (*Essentials*, Many Rivers Press, 2020, pp. 68-69)

Caught by a ray of light, something dramatically outlined in the outer world can find an equivalent deep down inside us, as we look on, illuminating an as yet un-encountered part of ourselves, just beginning to make itself known, bringing inner and outer

horizons together in one moment . . . "The Opening of Eyes," looks at the way that at any crucial moment in our life, there is never a choice between left or right, this way or that; it is always about taking a way forward that hold the two creatively together.
