

Meditation for the New Year January 3, 2021

Arise, shine; for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you.

[Isaiah 60:1]

During this year of transition, we are perhaps more aware than ever before that the magi's journey is *our* journey:

We too begin in the half-light just before dawn.

We too travel in a dangerous world.

Our destination is the same as theirs: To honor Christ with the gifts of our hearts.

At the beginning of each year, it has become my tradition to review the tips from Robert Fulghum's book, *All I Really Need to Know I learned in Kindergarten*. This year, I have found these simple tips especially reassuring:

- Share everything.
- Play fair.
- Don't hit people.
- Put things back where you found them.
- Clean up your own mess.
- Don't take things that aren't yours.
- Say you're sorry when you hurt somebody.
- Warm cookies and cold milk are good for you.
- Take a nap every afternoon.
- Be aware of wonder. Remember the little seed in the Styrofoam cup: the roots go down and the plant goes up and nobody really knows how or why, but we are all like that.
- When you go out in the world, watch out for traffic, hold hands and stick together.
