## DURING THIS TIME – MAY 2021

We have taken some important steps in preparing to return to in-person worship. This month our focus will be:

- Training a group of Digital Ministers who will coordinate hybrid worship.
- Organizing our storage and meeting spaces.

We will continue to hold 2 services every Sunday:

- 9 am - Our principal service of Morning Prayer on Zoom.
- 10:30 am - An outdoor service of Holy Communion in the parking lot; masks and social distancing required.

Because our sanctuary is small and public health protocols have not changed, there are different things we must do to make it a safe gathering place for worship.

### The Sanctuary

- We have purchased new filters for the furnace and stand-alone HEPA air purifiers, in addition to a CO<sub>2</sub> monitor.
- Our next step is to plan for occupancy by considering ways to expand participation through scheduling or using Murray Hall and the Lane Chapel.

### Worship

- We have purchased the computer, camera, and software necessary for livestreaming interactive hybrid worship.
- Our next step is to develop and train a technology team of Digital Ministers who will learn how to use new software to incorporate recorded instrumental and choral music into live worship and to incorporate interaction with the worship.

### Sunday School/Lane Chapel

- Arrange the furniture in the Lane Chapel to accommodate children following public health protocols.
- Plan for hybrid Sunday School so that our children can choose how to participate.

### Meeting and Storage Space

- Clear out and reorganize storage areas in the Blue Room, the Mary Moore Room, and the Basement.

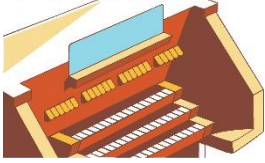
### Next Meetings: Sunday May 2<sup>nd</sup> & Sunday June 6<sup>th</sup> @ 7 PM on Zoom

## THE MUSIC OF EASTERTIDE

For more than a year, COVID has altered nearly all aspects of our lives. Church music has been no exception. The use of music in worship, given the adaptations required to keep everyone safe from spreading the virus, has forced worship leaders to find novel ways to add music into services. We at Trinity started with organ preludes and a couple of verses of a familiar hymn for Zoom worshipers to sing from their computer-based locations at home. Also, tech-savvy parishioners have worked diligently to find better and better ways to provide video and especially audio for our at-home Zoom worshippers. Now that we are in Eastertide, the decision was made to open Zoom worship with a hymn recognizing the season, a sung “Alleluia” response, a live solo, and ending worship with a celebratory postlude. The intent of the postlude is to express “the immense joy in our hearts when we receive the Eucharist and fill us with energy to go out and bring what we have received to others.”

The traditional Easter Day postlude is “Tocatta” from the *Organ Symphony V* by Charles Marie Widor (1844-1937), conveying that “immense joy and energy” with an allegro tempo, stunning organ registration, and a clever melody played by the feet. Other postludes for the season are based on hymn tunes such as “Gelobt sei Gott” [Hymnal #205], “Awake, Thou Wintry Earth” by Johann Sebastian Bach, and “God of Grace and God of Glory” [Hymnal #594], using the brilliant reed stops of the organ. Hopefully, we can continue that joy and energy expressed in these postludes not only during Eastertide but throughout the year.

## GOOD NEWS GARDENS



On Sunday, April 18<sup>th</sup>, Good News Gardens, Milford began our celebration of Earth Day by giving away several small plants. We also gave them away on Thursday, April 22<sup>nd</sup> and Sunday, April 25<sup>th</sup>. We had a little over 200 containers of plants (flowers and vegetables) to give away.

One of the people who took plants on April 18<sup>th</sup> explained that he had heard about the plants when he came to the community meals. His sister bought him a medium-sized planter box and he is excited to have a small, raised bed garden on the front lawn of his home. Some of the other residents are going to help him. He said he always had a garden growing up. He genuinely seemed enthusiastic about getting his hands in the dirt again. Another gentleman came to get some plants and we ended up chatting about the similarities and contrasts of the Catholic and the Episcopal churches. A very interesting conversation. We also had some of our parishioners take plants. Our hope is that people will share the harvest with others.

I am so appreciative to all who are helping to nurture this program. To name just a few...

Madelyn Stochaj created our logo. Mother Judith arranged to get the banner made. Dwight Kee hung the banner. The folks at community dinners gave out notices about GNG in the dinners-to-go. Millie Williams and Beth Moeller provided flowers and helped to plant them in the church planters. Our plan is to replace the pansies in the planters with vegetables after the risk of frost is gone. The Youth Group donated plastic containers, Wayne Stochaj loaned Charlie Johnson his power tools, and Charlie and Jon Haynes turned the five-gallon pails into self-watering planter/containers. We plan to give these away for people to grow tomatoes or pole beans. Marge Waugh donated seeds. Katherine Côté and Aida Mitchell donated containers and trays. The vestry supported this new mission. Charlie Johnson and his green thumb grew all the plants from seed. Kevin Keppler helped to carry flats of plants to help us set up on Sunday. To everyone, I say thank you.
